Through these events, MOIIA has served over 45,000 individuals in 2024 alone. We continue to see increased demand for the City's Language Access Plan, iSpeakATL, which provided over 15,000 minutes of interpretation this year - helping ensure language is never a barrier to connection.

I want to express my deepest gratitude to the many partners who have been instrumental in advancing my administration's priorities over the past year. This includes our consular and foreign trade offices, binational chambers of commerce, advocacy organizations, educational institutions, and more. Atlanta is a group project, and every partner has played a role in bolstering Atlanta's international presence and supporting our immigrant communities.

The dedicated team at MOIIA is hard at work developing Atlanta as a truly welcoming city – one where meaningful connections, inclusion, and opportunity are available to all. Together, we are shaping a future where Atlanta thrives as a global hub of innovation and culture. Dear MOIIA partners,

As I wrap up my first year as Director of the Mayor's Office of International and Immigrant Affairs – Welcoming Atlanta, I am thrilled to highlight another successful year of embodying our core mission of positioning Atlanta as a welcoming city.

2024 was a year of bolstering Atlanta's international presence and reaching new heights in our goals to empower our city's local communities. With the help of our 310 local, national, and international partners, MOIIA excelled in the areas of diplomacy, business, sports, education, and neighborhood empowerment.

In 2024, we hosted 89 delegations representing 98 countries. This year saw high-profile delegation visits, including the Dutch King and Queen and the President of Kenya. Our team also represented Atlanta abroad, with missions to France, Ireland, Sint Maarten, South Africa, and Zimbabwe.

In line with Mayor Dickens's Year of the Youth initiatives, our office empowers local and international youth. We hosted youth delegations from our sister cities in Nuremberg, Fukuoka, and Brussels, as well as young entrepreneurs from Sint Maarten. We are proud to engage in Atlanta's educational institutions and foreign-born youth for career and cultural development opportunities.

At Community Resource Events throughout the City of Atlanta, we are connecting residents to resources across a number of service areas. This year, we served close to 46,000 individuals representing 56 distinct countries. Alongside 112 public and private partners in 2024, this program is one of many ways we are engaging communities and supporting healthy, safe neighborhoods.

In continuing to position Atlanta as a welcoming city, iSpeakATL, the City's language access line, received over 15,800 minutes of interpretation calls in languages such as Spanish, French, Mandarin, and more. We are proud that City of Atlanta employees have conducted over 1,300 translation calls to better serve our Limited English Proficiency population.

Atlanta is a dynamic city, and I am incredibly grateful for the successes of 2024, made possible by the MOIIA team, our numerous partnerships, and the support and encouragement from Mayor Andre Dickens.



Public Service Interns

Our Public Service Internship (PSI) Program welcomed 13 students as part of our 13th, 14th, and 15th cohorts. This internship program is designed to offer undergraduate and graduate students an opportunity to engage and empower immigrant communities, while learning about professional development and civic engagement at the City of Atlanta. Students represented 5 different universities over the spring, summer, and fall.

Community Engagement Exchange Fellows

We welcomed 2 Fellows as part of the Community Engagement Exchange Program, a U.S. State Department program which offers young leaders from around the world the opportunity to engage with US civil society organizations. Our Fellows represented Egypt and Tajikistan, and they worked on data collection for our MyCity ATL program and research for iSpeakATL, the City’s Language Access Plan.



Social Work Interns

Our Social Work Internship Program entered its 4th year as we hosted 5 students throughout the spring and fall. The Social Work Internship Program is hosted in partnership with Georgia post-secondary institutions, including Georgia State University, Kennesaw State University, and the University of Georgia. Our Social Work interns complete their field practicum, a requirement for their Social Work degree, for the duration of one academic year and earn a total of 300-600 hours, depending on their specific degree program. This program was initiated in 2021 and has hosted 11 students since its inception.

One memory I am most proud of was during the Migrant’s Day Celebration at City Hall. Cristo Rey Corporate Work Study Program

This was our 7th year of welcoming student interns from Cristo Rey Atlanta Jesuit High School through their Corporate Work Study Program. Students participated in shadowing opportunities with other City of Atlanta departments and gained experience researching important topics relevant to our office.

We hosted and attended 71 youth-related activities or events, including local school engagement, international youth delegations, and events with youth engagement partners, alongside 106 partner organizations.

Youth Volunteers

We hosted 184 youth volunteers at our Community Resource Events, in partnership with Agape Youth and Family Center, Cristo Rey Atlanta Jesuit High School, Mays High School, Midtown High School, North Atlanta High School, and Spelman College. These volunteer opportunities help students earn Community Service Hours towards graduation, while showcasing ways to get involved in their own neighborhoods. This program exposes students to the work of our office and equips them to serve as ambassadors of care in their daily lives.

Bike Giveaway

This year, we distributed 43 bikes at our 6th Annual Bike Giveaway, which took place in an Adamsville neighborhood in February in partnership with Free Bikes 4 Kidz (FB4K), Young Middle School, and Mays High School. Since 2019, we have hosted Bike Giveaways with FB4K in 7 distinct neighborhoods, providing nearly 800 bikes to kids across the city. We also supported their Holiday Bike Giveaway again, which included 33 families from our neighborhoods. We are grateful to continue this partnership with Free Bikes 4 Kidz!



Spooky Family Day

We hosted our first-ever Spooky Family Day, with an estimated 200 families turning out to celebrate Halloween in North Atlanta. This event included distribution of 129 strider bikes for toddlers under age 4, in partnership with Free Bikes 4 Kidz Atlanta. 8 additional youth engagement and resource partners joined us to offer fun, interactive activities- including face painting, coloring, and games! We celebrated the spooky season in the community, complete with Halloween music, trick-or-treating, and costumes.



Students at Eid and El Grito

We welcomed students from Mays High School to 2 of our Welcoming Events at Atlanta City Hall: Eid and Mexican Independence Day. Students from Mays ESOL and the Hispanic Heritage Club toured City Hall, learned about city government, and participated in the festivities.

Cristo Rey Students HoPe Club

Our community engagement team established a partnership with Cristo Rey Atlanta Jesuit High School's HoPe Club (Hispanic Organization Promoting Education). Students supported 2 of our Community Resource Events and attended our World Migrants Day celebration in December.

Signature Welcoming Events

World Migrants Day

Mayor Andre Dickens hosted our first-ever celebration of World Migrants Day at City Hall! Alongside over 30 Consulates, international partners, immigrant-owned businesses, Sister Cities, local artists, and performance groups, we honored the experiences of migrants from around the world and recognized their significant contributions to our city.

Mayor Dickens and Dean of the Atlanta Consular Corps and Consul General of Mexico Javier Díaz de León delivered welcoming remarks, and performance groups represented a traditional Korean drum dance, Polish national dances, Mexican ballet folklórico, and dance from the Pacific Islands, including Tahiti and New Zealand. This culturally immersive event encouraged City employees and attendees to consider diverse perspectives and think globally.



Eid Reception

We were honored to host the first annual Mayor's Eid Reception at City Hall, in partnership with the Islamic Speakers Bureau of Atlanta. In celebration of this holy festival marking the conclusion of Ramadan, we were joined by members and leaders of the Muslim community here in Atlanta, students from Mays High School, Atlanta City Council representatives, and City of Atlanta employees! Performances included Alif Institute Tabla Drummers, singer Amira Unplugged, and Emory Qawwali Ensemble.

Mexican Independence Day

In celebration of the 214th anniversary of Mexican independence, Mayor Andre Dickens joined the Consulate General of Mexico in Atlanta for a special night honoring history and culture at City Hall. This commemoration of Mexican Independence Day included a presentation of the traditional El Grito by Consul General of Mexico Javier Díaz de León and performances by Soprano Carolina Herrera and Mariachi Pepe López. This was our fourth year bringing this significant occasion to City Hall, and we enjoyed uplifting the voices of Mexicans and Mexican-Americans in our city.



Naturalization Ceremony

During Welcoming Week 2024, we were honored to host our annual Naturalization Ceremony, which welcomed 50 new US citizens from 25 countries around the world. This special ceremony represents the culmination of an immigrant's journey to citizenship and confers all the rights and responsibilities of citizenship, including the right to vote and travel with a U.S. passport. Mayor Dickens offered congratulatory remarks, and participating organizations included Women Watch Afrika, Atlanta Passport Agency, Carver STEAM Academy, and Momonoki.



Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander Heritage Month Vendor Expo

We hosted an Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander (AANHPI) Vendor Expo at City Hall, in partnership with Microsoft. With 11 restaurant vendors, 3 cultural performance groups, and 4 artists, we celebrated the many cultures under the AANHPI umbrella. During this celebration of May as AANHPI Heritage Month, we recognized the diverse traditions, foods, music, and dance of our AANHPI communities and reflected on the important contributions of these communities to our city!



Diwali Celebration

At City Hall, Mayor Dickens hosted a celebration of Diwali, the Festival of Lights celebrated by millions of Hindus, Jains, and Sikhs around the world. The event included a ceremonial diya lamp lighting to symbolize the victory of good over evil, traditional Indian classical dance, and delicious Indian food. City Council President Shipman joined the celebration and presented a Proclamation recognizing Diwali in the City of Atlanta.



Passport Services Day

We hosted the first-ever Passport Services Day, in partnership with the Atlanta Passport Agency. This event offered assistance with passport applications and renewals for 79 City of Atlanta employees and their families. By improving access to passports for those eligible, we hope to facilitate international exchange and opportunities for Atlantans to travel and represent our city abroad.



Latinx Orgullo/Pride Reception

We loved celebrating the 2nd Annual Latinx Orgullo / Pride Reception, co-hosted by the Latino Community Fund at City Hall! This was a wonderful celebration of the intersection of LGBTQ+ and Latinx identities, complete with drag performances and remarks from Mayor Dickens. Thank you to the Latino Community Fund, for all your work to recognize and uplift our Latinx LGBTQ+ community.




Immigrant Integration Programs


TOP 10 LANGUAGES

We closed out our Emergency Food and Shelter Humanitarian Program in September 2024. We were able to support over 30,000 new arrivals who came to Georgia, and we supported this program with \$6,728,982.87. We are so thankful for our partners: Georgia Asylum Immigration Network, Casa Alterna, Latin American Association, Inspiritus, Catholic Charities, IMAN Center, Hispanic Alliance Georgia, Migrant Equity Southeast and the International Rescue Committee.





Local and National Engagements

Maximizing Global Talent Event

Director Paulina Guzman delivered welcoming remarks at the Global Talent Event “Maximizing Global Talent: Expanding Georgia’s Healthcare Workforce,” hosted by the BIG Partnership. This event focused on inclusive responses to healthcare workforce shortages in the state of Georgia.



Cities 4 Action

As a member of the steering committee for Cities for Action, our team participated in the annual Cities for Action (C4A) Convening in New York City. C4A is made up of local governments from across the United States. This year, C4A brought together not only cities, but also advocates, philanthropists, and other key stakeholders committed to advancing pro-immigrant policies. Our goal is to address common challenges, share best practices, and develop a unified roadmap to promote immigrant justice at all levels of government and beyond.

New Employee Orientations

Across 8 trainings, we presented to over 500 new employees at the City of Atlanta Department of Human Resource's New Employee Orientations to inform them about iSpeakATL—the City’s Language Access Plan.



Strong Cities Transatlantic Webinar

Director Paulina Guzman participated in a Strong Cities Transatlantic Webinar, titled “Global Crises, Local Impacts: Threats to Social Cohesion and How Cities Can Respond.” Paulina highlighted the importance of local coordination to support welcoming policies and respond to disinformation, particularly related to anti-migrant sentiments and violence.

International Volunteer Day

We hosted our 4th International Volunteer Day, which welcomed 48 volunteers in celebration of the United Nations’ International Volunteer Day. Volunteers represented the Consulates General of the Bahamas, France, and the United Kingdom, the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine Georgia and Trinity Anglican Church.


Community Resource Events



In 2024, our community engagement team undertook a survey and long-form interview project to measure program impact. Over 250 surveys and 30 interviews were conducted across 9 neighborhoods. The results demonstrate a significantly positive impact on family stability, wellbeing, connection, and sense of belonging within communities and within the City of Atlanta. Many described the program as transformative and credited it with improving their quality of life.

Participants report feeling comfortable asking for help from Welcoming Atlanta in comparison to 72% feeling comfortable reaching out to City government




Participants report feeling safer in their community




Second Helpings Atlanta

Since 2021, the Meals with Meaning program with Second Helpings Atlanta has supported fresh food access in our neighborhoods, serving nearly 36,000 individuals at 70 Community Resource Events this year alone. The Meals with Meaning program came to a close at the end of 2024, and we are deeply grateful for Second Helpings’ partnership and their commitment to improving food access in the communities we serve.



Friends of Sara J. González Memorial Park

We partnered with the Friends of Sara J. González Memorial Park to host our signature Back-to-School Resource Fair, which saw the largest turnout ever of 326 families and provided school supplies to 434 students. Our 5th Annual Winter Resource Fair brought together 30+ Community Partners to distribute nearly 750 toys, an estimated 8,800 pounds of groceries and more!


Atlanta Braves Foundation and Georgia Power

Alongside the Atlanta Braves Foundation and Georgia Power, we co-hosted 12 Community Resource Events, serving over 6,800 individuals with protein boxes, fresh food items, and hot meals. This signature collaboration demonstrates the power of public-private partnerships and is a key example of how we are bringing together important local stakeholders to create positive change.



Neighborhood Empowerment

Health & Wellbeing



CORE Georgia

Since 2021, CORE Georgia has administered 1,185 vaccinations at our Community Resource Events, including 290 COVID-19 and flu vaccines this year. The CORE team has expanded our ability to improve health equity and vaccine accessibility in our communities, and their bilingual team has also provided medical benefits navigation, HIV/STI testing, Narcan, and other health resources.



ICNA Relief Georgia

ICNA Relief Georgia offered health screenings at 5 Community Resource Events, totaling 206 glucose and blood pressure screenings throughout the year. At our co-hosted Back-to-School Resource Fair, we also distributed backpacks and school supplies to 94 families.



Someone Cares

Someone Cares' Mobile Health Unit attended 9 Community Resource Events this year. Their team conducted 111 health screenings and accessible HIV testing. Additional services included referrals to clinical care, addiction support, and assistance navigating a positive HIV diagnosis.



Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine (PCOM) Georgia

In our third year partnering with PCOM Georgia, medical students participated in our annual Winter Resource Fair with the Friends of Sara J. González Memorial Park. The PCOM Georgia team administered 88 health screenings, decorated toy stethoscopes, and offered tours of their 'Simulance,' which allows children to experience a simulated ambulance.

Neighborhood Empowerment

Community Navigator Program

Our Community Navigator program is hosted in partnership with the Latino Community Fund and empowers Spanish-speaking leaders to facilitate resource access in their communities. Navigators participate in training opportunities with various partner organizations, gaining valuable knowledge to share with residents. Through these efforts, they build meaningful connections and actively contribute to a variety of community engagement initiatives.

This year, we hosted 9 in-language Navigator trainings with 8 organizations, including Asian Americans Advancing Justice- Atlanta, Atlanta Volunteer Lawyers Foundation, Atlanta Police Department Code Enforcement Section, LaAmistad, Latino Community Fund, Mi Familia Vota, Operation Hope, and YMCA. Navigators also supported 31 additional events and community engagement activities for 9 City of Atlanta departments and 19 external community partners.

In her position as a Navigator, Veronica C. led conversations with the Consulate General of Ecuador in Atlanta. She met with local leaders to discuss the needs of the Ecuadorian community and her role as a Community Navigator with our office, and she attended a ceremony unveiling a new work of art now hanging at the Consulate.

Neighborhood Empowerment

Victims' Services and Public Safety

Our Victims' Services Program provides direct victim services to Limited English Proficient and foreign-born victims of crime. Since 2019, we have received funding from Georgia's Criminal Justice Coordinating Council to carry out a culturally competent victim assistance program. Our current funding allows for three bilingual staff members part-time to provide direct victim services to Limited English Proficient and foreign-born victims of crime and oversee grant administration. We have also partnered with 6 multicultural victims' services organizations to offer resources at 33 Community Resource Events this year.

In 2024, we expanded place-based community engagement efforts in Southwest Atlanta to serve a community of asylum seekers fleeing persecution in their home countries. 499 households were provided assistance in the form of fresh food, clothing, personal hygiene items, and pro-bono legal resources in their native languages. We worked with religious and community leaders to connect community members to critical public safety resources to avoid further victimization and discrimination.



Domestic Violence Awareness Month

Domestic Violence Awareness Month presents the opportunity to improve understanding around domestic violence, particularly when it comes to immigrant survivors. Due to immigration status and other factors, immigrants may face disproportionate challenges to leaving their abuser, including limited language proficiency, disparities in economic and social resources, social isolation, and fear of reporting.

Our team participated in the first Multicultural Candlelight Vigil, hosted in partnership with several immigrant and refugee-serving organizations in Atlanta, including the Cherokee Family Violence Center, Raksha, Caminar Latino, Tapestri, Karibou, Tahirih Justice Center and Noor Family Services. The Candlelight Vigil served to honor and remember the many lives tragically lost to domestic violence.

Community Navigator Anabel A. joined Tapestri's 5th Domestic Violence Forum, an annual opportunity to learn about recognizing, preventing, and responding to domestic violence.

We also participated in the Mayor's Office of Violence Reduction's "No More" Domestic Violence Awareness Employee Lunch and Learn, where our partners at Cherokee Family Violence Center participated in an informational panel.



Neighborhood Empowerment

MyCity ATL Program

MyCity ATL is a community engagement program in partnership with Atlanta Public Schools Adult ESOL, and it is structured to empower our immigrant and refugee population to directly engage with City of Atlanta services on topics that are important to New Americans. This year's cohort consisted of 53 participants, representing 18 countries.




The City of Atlanta Hosts Dutch King and Queen
